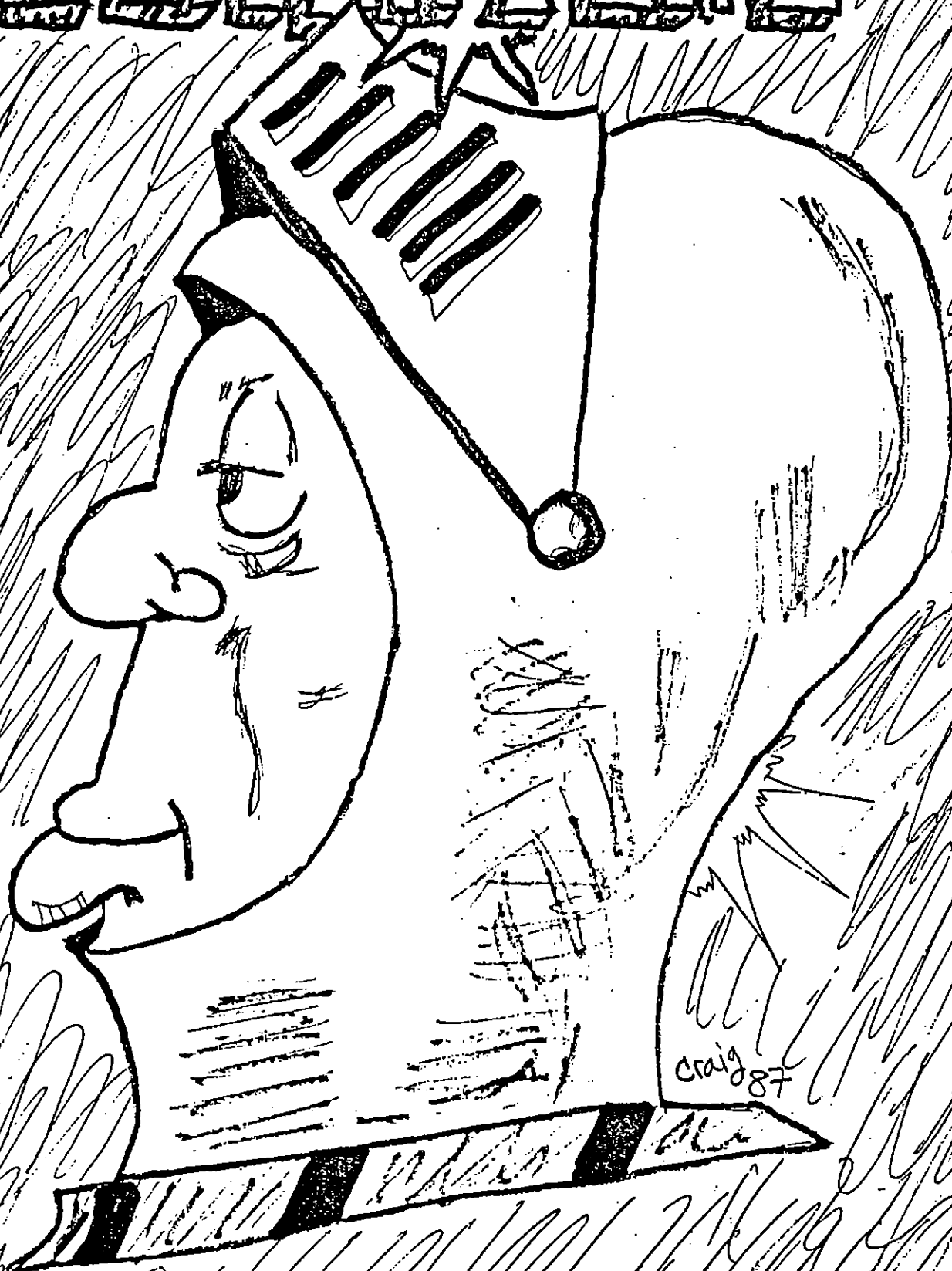

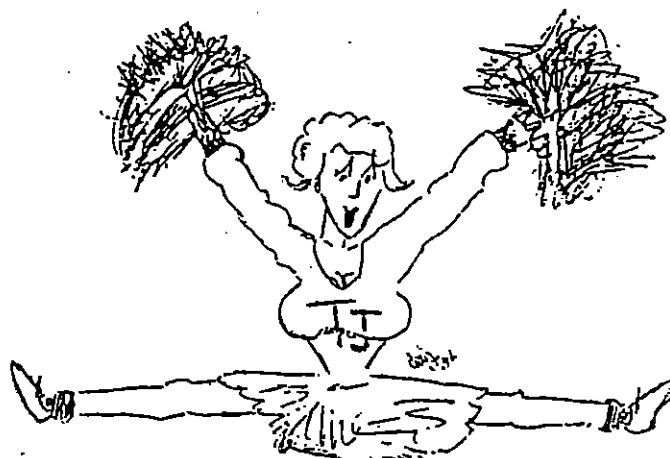
**GETTING INTO THE GROOVE**

Thanks a lot Student Council and let's make the rest of the year just as great.

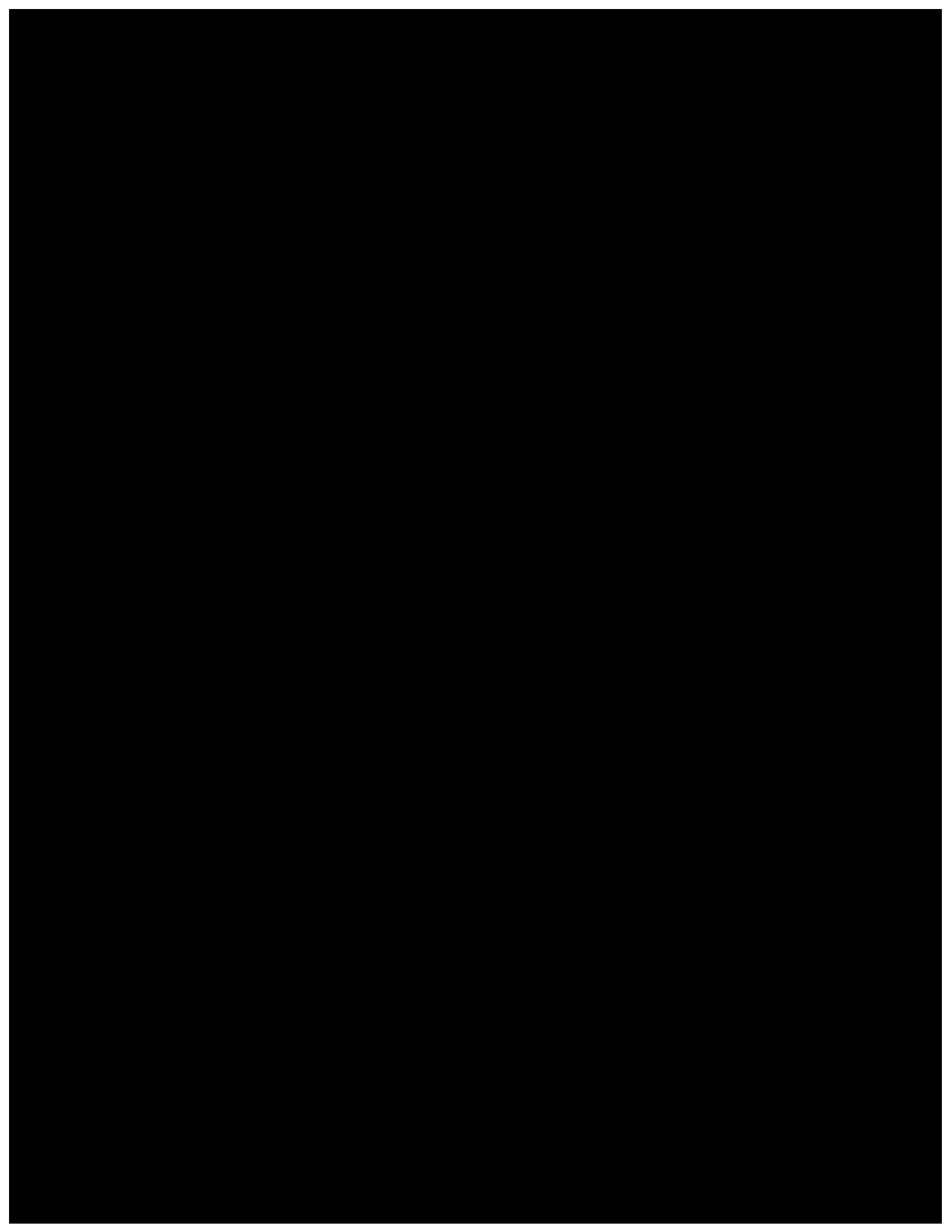


**TORREJON HIGH'S SPIRIT LEADERS**

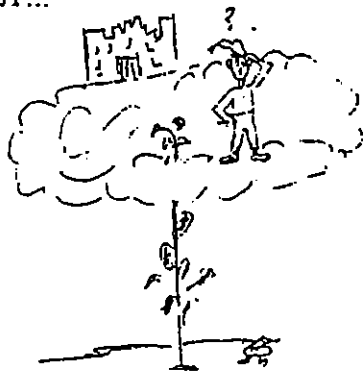

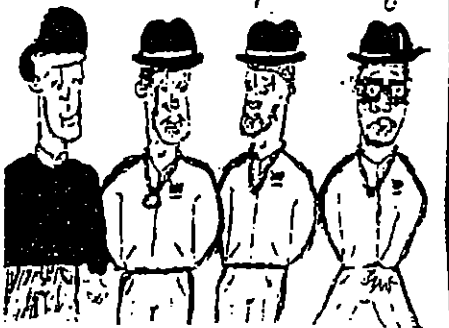

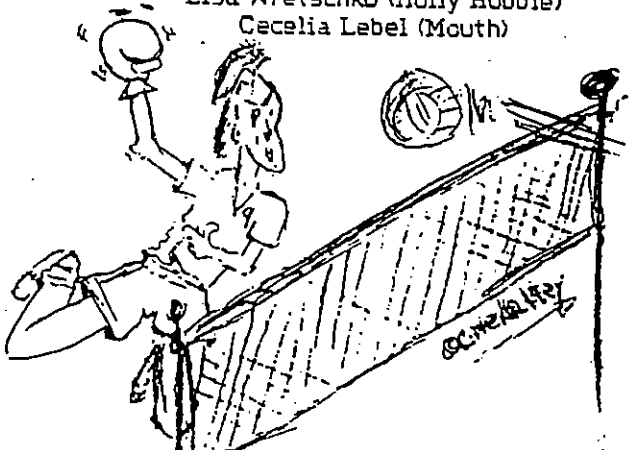
