It appears that many student leaders are chosen, as are many national leaders, based on popularity, not on qualifications, dedication, or views on the issues. In the upcoming SCA elections, it is hoped that students will make careful selections. The elected officers represent the interests of the voters. In the end, the effectiveness of the SCA depends directly on the quality of students elected to office.

Last but not least, Torrejon had three outstanding cadets that survived the grueling inspection and came out without a flaw. These three perfect-inspection cadets were C/Col. Sean McKenna, C/Sgt Brian Cross, and C/1st Lt. Charles Cain.

The over-all winning trophy was received by Ramstein. Though our cadets were disappointed at first, they set a goal to retrieve the trophy during next year's competition and will bring it here to stay!

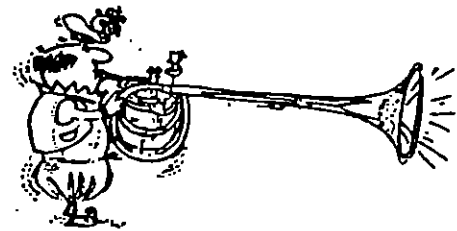

The Zab community was extremely accommodating and hospitable. Hopefully we can repay them next year when the music festival is held here in Torrejon.

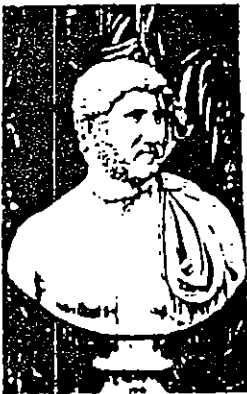
EIGHTH-GRADE GOES TO PRADO

JOURNALISTS VISIT NEWS MAGAZINE

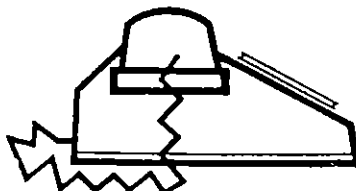

YEARBOOK MEETS DEADLINES

It's Saturday afternoon and the halls of the high school are quiet. Inside the art room, however, there is a buzz of activity. The yearbook staff is trying to meet a deadline. Mr. Thompson, the yearbook sponsor, labors over the cover design, while frantic members type copy, lay out pages and develop film in the dark room. Thoughts of other things they could be doing often cross their minds.

The scene described was a familiar one to the 1988 Yearbook staff. Forty people showed up at the first meeting, and the number gradually decreased as the year wore on, until fewer than ten remained. Of these few, only two were seniors.

Editors Margo Tucker and Lesley Boyd began the year with a five thousand dollar debt hanging over their heads. The newly organized staff began earning money to pay off the accumulated debt and the cost of the 1988 yearbook. Much of the income came from the sale of yearbooks; however, a sizeable part resulted from the sale of advertisements. The staff also spent several cold winter mornings in front of the Exchange selling baked goods and patron advertisements.

For the first time, an Apple computer was used to type the copy included in the annual, and to type the letters sent to prospective advertisers. Next year, the staff will be using a new computer program to design the pages.

Although it sometimes seemed impossible, the yearbook staff met their deadlines, and all shipments were received on time at the company. The yearbooks were shipped from the publisher on the first of May and are scheduled to arrive here in early June. There are approximately fifty yearbooks remaining to be sold for thirty dollars each.

Challenge '88 is a three-week college credit program for students who will be juniors and seniors next year. AIDS

WHAT ABOUT AIDS?

Lately, it seems that we have been bombarded with news about AIDS, acquired immune deficiency syndrome. But what can we expect? Right now it is a major epidemic affecting millions of people around the world. Especially in Africa, the population with this deadly disease is overwhelming. Why? Because of lack of education. Many people don't know what AIDS is or where it comes from. The only thing they can think is, "Why are all these people getting sick? Why are so many dying?"

Everybody should be aware of AIDS, the facts and myths. Recently, KNIGHTLIFE conducted a poll to see how much we, the students of Torrejon High, know about AIDS. What follows are the results of the poll and some facts.

The question that seemed to puzzle the most students was whether or not AIDS can be transmitted by an insect bite, say a mosquito. Out of the 380 people who took the poll, 27% thought this was true. It is, of course, false. Some might say, "but mosquitoes transmit malaria; they must be able to transmit AIDS too." A specific kind of mosquito transmits malaria. It can't all of a sudden switch jobs and start transmitting AIDS. Consider also; if AIDS were carried by insects, you would see as many children as adults getting it. But you don't.

The second most missed question was, "Can AIDS be transmitted from kissing?" Kissing a person on the cheek doesn't put you at risk, and no cases have been reported where the virus was passed by kissing on the mouth. Small amounts of the virus are sometimes found in saliva, but it is not enough to infect another person with AIDS. 15% of the students thought the virus could be transmitted by kissing.

Six percent think AIDS is only a homosexual disease. Anyone can get AIDS if they don't take precautions. Prostitutes, I V drug users, homosexuals, bisexuals, and heterosexuals can all get AIDS. As for blood transfusions, blood is now checked for the virus.

AIDS cannot be passed through casual contact. That includes the toilet seat, public showers, swimming pools, or simply being around someone who is infected with the virus. Seven per cent

thought AIDS could be transmitted from a toilet seat.

At the moment there is no known cure for AIDS, and it is expected to take at least several years before there is an effective vaccine. Six per cent of the students thought AIDS could be cured.

Out of the 190 girls who were polled, 41% aren't afraid of getting AIDS although 42% are sexually active. Of 190 guys, 56% are sexually active and 59% are afraid of getting AIDS.

You may believe AIDS doesn't affect you personally, but it does. AIDS affects us all, directly or indirectly. Hopefully, we are educated well enough to take precautions against getting this deadly disease.

Information about AIDS is available from the school nurse and in the Media Center.

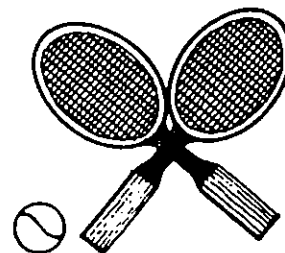

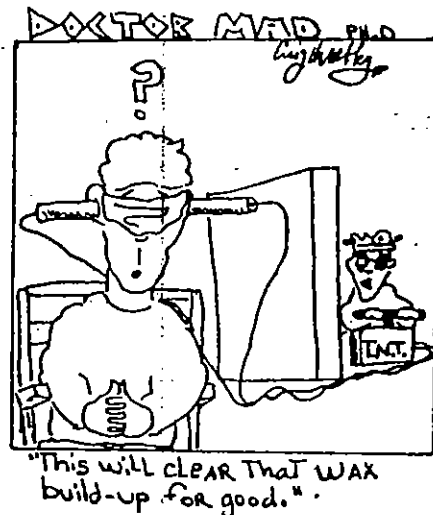

College Poll by Michael Lemons

Back in December, a poll was taken of most Juniors and Seniors to find if they were planning to attend college, and if they were, what state wanted to go to and what college they wanted to attend. Of the 156 students asked, 82 (53%) were Juniors and 74 (47%) were Seniors.

IN TOTAL:

- 134 (86%) students said they planned to go to college.
- 12 (8%) students said they did not plan to go to college.
- 5 (3%) students said they were not sure of their plans.
- 5 (3%) students did not answer.

Those who said they planned to go to college picked 84 different colleges and 31 different states which they planned or hoped to go to. There were also 28 students (21% of those who answered "yes") who were not sure what college they would attend, and 12 (9%) who did not know or care what state they went to.

The top states to go to were:

- 1: FLORIDA, picked by 29 (22%) of the students.
- 2: CALIFORNIA, picked by 28 (21%) of the students.
- *3: TEXAS, picked by 8 1/2 (6%) of the students.
- 4: WASHINGTON, picked by 7 (5%) of the students.
- 5: MASSACHUSETTS and NEW YORK, each picked by 5 (4%) of the students.

The top colleges were:

- 1: FLORIDA STATE, picked by 6 students.
- *2: UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI, picked by 5 1/2 students.
- 3: WASHINGTON ST. UNIVERSITY, picked by 5 students.
- 4: UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA, picked by 4 students.

In addition, many students listed college systems instead of specific colleges. 9 students picked colleges in the University of California system, but some did not say a specific college and simply wrote down "University of California", therefore naming a number of colleges, as there are 8 different University of California colleges. The same happened with the University of

Maryland college system (picked by 6 students) and the California State University system (picked by 5 students).

Significant differences between Junior polls and Senior polls were that more Juniors were not sure whether they were going to college or not (only one Senior was unsure), more Juniors were unsure of which college they wanted to attend, and that while Florida was the top state by a wide margin for Seniors, California was the top state by a wide margin for Juniors.

* Some students wrote down two colleges or two states; in these cases, each state or college received half a point.
